I totalled 127lb of fish listed it below; Common carp = 17lb, 9.5lb, 11lb, 9lb, 9.5lb, 10lb, 6.5lb, 9lb, 8.5lb, 7.5lb and 10lb. Mirror carp = 7.5lb and 9lb. Bream = 3lb.

Red Kites in the Severn Valley

We are all used to seeing Buzzards and hearing their distinctive call when fishing the River Severn. It now appears that another large hawk is taking up residence in the valley. The Fisheries Team were at Arley on the 13th August, clearing swims on the left bank upstream of the car park. A large hawk was seen flying over the field on the same bank whilst being mobbed by resident rooks from the nearby wood. Its distinctive V tail and red colouring identified it as a Red Kite rather than the usual Buzzard.

Midland Angler

Copied below is an extract from the Midland Angler, the forerunner to the BAA News.

March 1948 edition

Cupping the Ground-bait

by Captain L. A. Parker

THIS is a method often successful when all other methods fail, and can be employed under any conditions of water or weather. Although recommended for float-ledgering, it can be used for any style of ledgering provided the ground-bait is made stiff enough to withstand the strain of a long cast.

The usual method of ground-baiting when ledgering is to pinch some either round the shot of your float tackle or on the lead if ledgering in the usual manner. This method is quite all right, but we can go one better. In the first place, the idea of putting ground bait on the shot or ledger is to attract fish to your bait, so why not attract them to the very spot where your bait lays, by putting it round the bait, or partially so.

We all know how readily fish feed on groundbait and I have proved to my own satisfaction with the aid of a water telescope, that nine times out of ten fish start feeding on the ground-bait first. Hence the importance of having your bait near to it.

Cupping the ground-bait is a very simple process. First you make up a small ball about the size of a walnut and pinch it round the gut of the hook length. Then press your finger into it at the end nearer the bait and so make a hole or cup, so to speak. Now run the ground-bait down on to the bait, when it will be partially hidden from view. Do not use stiff ground-bait, but keep it as light as conditions of water will allow.

You now have things as they should be, the fish are attracted to your ground-bait, start feeding on it, and quickly discover a more tempting morsel which they invariably go for instead of continuing to feed on the ground-bait. In any case, your chances of catching fish are much better because you have attracted them to the "exact spot."

I used this method as a lad and do so today whenever I am float fishing from the bank and about to have my lunch. I push my float up eighteen inches or so, on with a piece of crust or paste and groundbait cup, and into the water it goes. This must be a gentle action and in the right spot, because you do not want to drag

the ground-bait along the bottom and so remove it from the bait. I have had my lunch in discomfort many times when fishing this way and also when I have decided to give swimming a rest—may you be treated likewise.

When the river is in flood is also a favourite time of mine to use this method. I walk along the bank trying all the shallow lay-byes, first with crust, then with worm or paste, but always using the cup ground-bait. I have been astounded many times by the ferocious nature of the bites and the number of fish caught.

The reason for this is undoubtedly due to the fact that fish start feeding on the ground-bait and continue to do so because nothing disturbs or happens to them. They have fed on it many times before, their suspicion is allayed, and finding a far more attractive bait in the centre, they take it with gusto. Stiff ground-bait on the hook is also very deadly when fishing this way.

Fish Migrations.

During the summer of 1947, an investigation of the migrations of salmon and sea-trout was carried out by the Ministry of Agriculture off the mouth of the Yorkshire Esk at Whitby. 66 fish were netted and released alive after a distinctive mark consisting of a small celluloid tube containing a slip of paper with instructions as to the return of the marks had been attached to the dorsal fin by a loop of silver wire.

Since then, fifteen fish or their markings have been returned. Of the recaptured fish, nine were taken within two miles of the place of marking after varying periods of liberty. The remaining five travelled greater distances. Three were accounted for off the Northumberland coast some seventy miles north of the marking station, one—a sea trout—was taken by rod and line in the Coquet and the other was found in a tributary of the Tweed on December 13th, 1947, over five months after being marked. Further experiments this summer will, it is hoped, lead to a fairly clear picture of the migrations of salmon and sea-trout.

Fisheries Satnav guide

In recent editions of the Guide to Waters and on the BAA website 'Where to fish' pages, Ordnance Survey National Grid Reference Coordinates have been included for all our fisheries except canals. These are provided for anglers to quote if they need to make a 999 call from a fishery to enable the emergency services to locate them.

The table below includes all the BAA Ordnance Survey National Grid Reference Coordinates with their equivalent Latitude and Longitude values. The conversion was done using the following website;

My thanks to Chris Veness who created the website.

Most satnav devices accept Latitude/Longitude inputs, so you can now use your satnavs to guide you to our fisheries.

Some of our fisheries have more than one car park; the list below only provides a satnav Lat/Long reference to the car park associated with the OS reference. So if you visit one of our other fishery car parks and have your satnav with you, record its' Lat/Long reference and email the information to the BAA. I can then add it to the list and provide regular updates (that's why I've included a version number).

A small word of caution, I used my satnav when visiting Stanley fishery on the Severn (Guide page 44). As the OS reference is for a location about a ½ mile from the road down a farm track, my satnav could not plot a direct route as it does not hold a map of the track. It plotted a route to the other bank and then crossed the river where no bridge exists. In this and similar cases I will update the list with a satnav reference for the access point to the car park on the public highway.

If you find any problems or have additional Lat/Long references you want added please let us know?




