Bailiffing

LITTER LOUT FINED FOR LEAVING RUBBISH AT COPPICE LAKE

Back in May, before the disaster which befell Coppice Lake and which caused its closure, a party of three members spent a weekend at the fishery, including fishing at night.

Subsequently our Bailiff, on a routine visit to the pool, found a large black bin liner full of rubbish dumped on the car park. The bag contained the remnants of a fishing trip including empty cans and bottles, food packaging etc.



Following some diligent investigation work by Superintendant Bailiff Dave Webb, the person responsible for dumping the rubbish was identified and the case was referred to the Association's General Purposes Committee (G.P.C.). This is the body made up of members from the Executive Committee which is charged with dealing with all alleged breaches of the Association's Bye-Laws.

The GPC contacted the member concerned, who had little alternative but to hold up his hands to the charge of deliberately discarding rubbish on Association property. The GPC approved that a fine of $\pounds 50$ be levied on the member and that he be barred from having any further night permits for a considerable period. These sanctions were subsequently endorsed by the whole Executive Committee.

The member, who for the purposes of this Newsletter shall remain anonymous, accepted the ruling and has since paid his fine. The moral of the story is this; **DON'T DISCARD RUBBISH ON ANY BAA FISHERIES AND THINK YOU WILL NOT BE FOUND OUT!**

On this occasion the member at least retained membership – the next person found out may not be so fortunate.

This year saw not the best river conditions! Arriving on Friday $13^{\rm th}$ you would have thought this should have told us something? But we continued with our quest which incidentally saw many other anglers seek the comfort of a carp pool or the pub.

We took the trouble in the pouring rain to find slack water, behind flooded willows, natural features such as bends in the river, anything that causes an eddy that slowed the ravages and force of the river in flood. And although the number of fish caught in the chocolate brown water this year was lower than in more clement times, we all caught. In fact for the 4 days we caught 51 barbel, 1 chub, 2 eels and 3 1lb roach. Nordley shoot cancelled

In the October 2011 edition we reported that the BAA had agreed for a winter shoot (1^{st} September to 31^{st} January) to take place at the Lakes on Thursdays every two weeks commencing 2012. Since the initial request the BAA has received no further communication from the individuals concerned. As a result the agreement to allow the shoot at Nordley is cancelled.

Fence at Barton

The fence put in place across the river bank at Barton restricting access to the downstream end of the fishery has been removed.

Midland Angler

Copied below are two extracts from the Midland Angler, the forerunner to the BAA News.

December 1946 edition

BARBEL for the SEVERN?

HOUGH the barbel is an indigenous fish in this country, the fact remains that it is to be found in few of our rivers. To the natural question "Why?" one can only suggest that it is particular about it's food and tipple. Sixty years ago the Trent held a good stock of this fish. Today apart from a single specimen taken in the Severn, near Bewdley, last season, one never hears of them. In the last annual report of the Trent Board, no mention is made of a single capture. There can be only one explanation. If you want the fish with barbules or "whiskers" you must go to the Thames, the Hampshire Avon, one or two other smaller rivers in the South or to the Yorkshire Ouse and Swale. If the efforts of the Severn Board are successful, Midland anglers may make acquaintance with this fine fighting fish.

Writing to us on the subject, a Thames angler, whose admiration for the species leads to the description of himself as a "barbel maniac," informs us that the nearest likely river for Midlanders is the Ouse at St. Ives in Huntingdonshire. A strong advocate of its wider distribution, he is delighted with the attempts to introduce barbel to the Severn and thinks that river and others with gravelly beds would make suitable habitats. Assurances of this kind are encouraging and the appearance in home waters of a fish that can fight more vigorously than a pike and as well as a salmonis heartily welcomed. Anyway, it will be a very

interesting experiment to see whether Kennet barbel will take kindly to Midland rivers. Winter Weather.

Like the farmer, the angler being also dependent to a large extent upon the weather for the success of his efforts, is said to be always complaining of never getting exactly what he wants. Whether this charge is true or not need not be argued. The fact is indisputable that the angler this year has had to face weather vagaries that take a lot of beating. Beyond a short spell of proper summer-like weather when the thermometer soared to 80 in the shade, nothing seems to have gone right with a proper regard for the calendar. And now November, never a kindly month, has left behind it the record of the heaviest rainfall for forty years, of rivers breaking their bounds to flood a big acreage, and of high winds to add to the winter's discontent. In the circumstances the angler has behaved nobly. Has it stopped his fishing? No. Others may have cowered over a fireplace in the vain hope of extracting a little warmth from something that is falsely called coal, but the angler, like Casabianca is "a creature of heroic blood" and defying the elements, however rude and boisterous, went forth hopeful always and often more successful than he anticipated. This is not the time or the occasion to review the coarse fish season of 1946, but we fancy it will be found that notwithstanding all drawbacks Midlanders will not come out so badly after all.

Latest News of the "Big 'Un"

This year's event is proving to be more popular than ever before, over 5,000 entries having already been received. There are, however, large numbers of anglers who, owing to holidays during the original dates fixed for the selling of tickets, have been unable to enter. Thanks to the co-operation of midland angling associations, who have so willingly allowed the use of their waters, an unlimited number of entries can be pegged down, and it has been decided, therefore, to continue to accept entries until all demands have been met. Tickets can FOUR be obtained either at the Thorp Street headquarters of the B.A.A., on Tuesday and Thursday evenings, or from the Secretary, Mr. W. T. Ward, at 156, Inkerman Street, Birmingham.

Fishing will commence on Sunday, October 6th, at 10.30 a.m., and finish at 1.30. Every competitor must have a keep-net. All species of fish are eligible, and only eels or fish that are too big for the keep-net may be weighed dead. Worms and maggots are the only hook and groundbait allowed, and the water must not be disturbed in any way before the start. When the whistle sounds for the end of the match, competitors must remain by their pegs until the umpires arrive to weigh in their catch.

Lady competitors, veterans over 70, or disabled men should see that their umpire enters details on his lists.


Entries for the Mitchells and Butler Trophy, open to the best three from any club, will be accepted at the waterside. The fee is 1/-, and the whole of the proceeds are devoted to the benevolent fund.

The five special trains for the match will leave as follows:—

Lane, Oldbury, Dudley Port, Tipton, Deepfields, Ettingshall Road, Wolverhampton, Four Ashes, Gailey, Penkridge, and arriving at Stafford at 8.35 a.m. The return train leaves Stafford at 5.35 p.m.

No. 4. 7.50 a.m., from Birmingham, calling at Vauxhall, Aston, Witton, Perry Barr, Great Barr, Bescot, Walsall, Four Ashes, Gailey, Penkridge, and arriving at Stafford at 9.17 a.m. The return train leaves Stafford at 6.0 p.m.

No. 5. 7.20 a.m., from Kings Norton, calling at Selly Oak, Birmingham, Saltley, Wilnecote, Tamworth, Elford, Barton, and arriving at Burton-on-Trent at 8.48 a.m. The return train leaves Burton at 5.30 p.m.

Details of special road transport facilities will be announced in the local Press as soon as possible.

One final word. Please be quite sure that no litter of any sort whatsoever is left on the banks.

Teme news

Record rainfall this year caused the Teme to top its banks on every BAA section on two occasions since the start of the river season. Members who regularly fish the river will have noted the considerable damage that has occurred to the banks in many places. Particularly badly affected are Cotheridge and Bransford. At Cotheridge, above the car park, a large willow straddles the river across one of the most popular pegs, while below the car park the river in one spot is at least twenty feet wider. At Bransford, the banks resemble the after-effects of a tsunami and the majority of the pegs are no longer fishable because of fallen trees. The Environment Agency will be contacted and hopefully the pegs will be reinstated as soon as possible. Members fishing the Teme should be prepared to cut their own toe-holds where the banks are steep as erosion has removed most that were there.

However, on a positive note, good fish are still being caught and the floods have created swims which were previously unfishable.

Ed; Thanks for your feedback on the website.

Currently I would not want to have a BAA on-line discussion forum (similar to Maggotdrowning.com) for the reason that all the posts would need to be reviewed by a moderator before being published on the forum. That could be a full time job and something we don't currently have the resource to support. A Twitter feed may be a better alternative for us, where we can post messages of interest to our followers, and they can send us info on their fishing which we can then send out to all our followers. These messages are restricted to a maximum size of 140 characters and can be received on PCs, smart phones and tablet computers

What iPad/iPhone App would you envisage we require? To produce one we would need to define the required App, and then engage a web developer to produce the App which would have a significant cost and finally get agreement from Apple to have our App available for download. This is not something we see a current need for.

Dear Sir,

With reference to the item in the July news letter regarding Coppice, and bearing in mind I know nothing about fishery management, three points were of interest:

First excessive ground bait, while I have not seen it happen often, on my last visit before closure, a huge amount of surplus bait was thrown in by one angler when leaving the lake. I'm not joking when I say it would have lasted me a week, and this from someone who gave a running commentary on all "14" fish he caught, for all the lake to hear, seemingly an all the gear no idea angler. One wonders if a lot of bait just lies rotting on the bottom, not good practice.

Vegetation, more plants would seem a good bet, not the stuff that's taken over Stubbs please, Coppice is somewhat bare, more rushes around the lake and a number of lily pads would certainly enhance the lake, add interest, and encourage natural food of which there must be little. Bearing in mind the head of fish, I sometimes wonder what they would all eat if it were not for artificial food thrown in. You mentioned the large carp overgraze the oxygen making plants, which would indicate more are needed, they like natural food.

And finally, there is obviously a huge number of fish in the lake, no doubt many thousands, probably tens of thousands of small skimmers etc all taking oxygen. These do provide good sport for those happy with small silvers and a good stock is necessary, but would not netting and removal of a large number of the smallest be good for the lake?

One more finally as a side note, I have fished the lake many many times and the carp caught are never less than six or seven pounds, they spawn every year, so where are all the small carp, where are the one, two pound and 8 ounce carp, it puzzles me, any ideas?

Ed; Thanks for your comments on Coppice. The BAA Fisheries Team carried out a test fishing session in early July to help with the decision of re-opening. The methods used were mainly float/maggot and some feeder with an absolute minimum of groundbait used. Everyone caught fish continually throughout the 4 hour session, which were mainly roach followed by skimmer bream and perch with a single large eel hooked but not landed. No carp of any size were caught, but a number have been seen swimming close to the surface.

Your point about carp sizes is interesting. When we removed the dead fish at the time of the fish kill. All the dead carp were large double figure fish, but there were plenty of dead roach and bream of all sizes, we also only found three dead perch and one eel. It will be interesting to see the type and size of fish caught when the pool is reopened on Sunday 12th August.

I agree with your view on an increased level of vegetation in the pool. Reeds and lily pads would improve the appearance of the water, help with water oxygen levels and provide refuges for the fish against cormorant predation. I will keep you informed on what plans the BAA has for Coppice.

Ed; Last month Mark Charnock wrote to us raising concerns about fish handling as a result of an incident he witnessed at Stanley Waters. Mark's concerns were discussed during the August BAA Executive Meeting. It was decided initially to include articles in future BAA News editions on good fish handling and welfare, and as a result of these articles if necessary include new rules in the byelaws.

It's time to let MPs hear anglers' anger over cormorant damage

Get behind the Angling Trust's *Action on Cormorants* campaign

The Angling Trust has today launched the Action on Cormorants campaign which urges anglers to write to their MPs supporting the call to put cormorants and goosanders on the general licence on an annual, reviewable basis. This would give them the same status as rooks, crows, jays and magpies whose numbers can be controlled without resort to specific licence. Currently angling clubs and fishery managers have to use a bureaucratic, cumbersome and ineffective licensing system which has completely failed to protect stocks of vulnerable silver fish and salmon smolts in most parts of the country. Cormorant predation also has had a significant impact on endangered species such as the European eel.

The campaign is supported by ten fisheries, angling and wildlife organisations including the Salmon and Trout Association, the Angling Trades Association, The Rivers Trust and angling celebrities such as TV host Chris Tarrant and singer Feargal Sharkey. Other partners include the award winning Avon Roach Project which features in a specially made campaign video by wildlife film maker Hugh Miles. There is a dedicated webpage at www.anglingtrust.net/cormorants, an online message facility and 80,000 postcards to be distributed to anglers via fisheries and tackle shops.

Anglers will be asked to contribute to a 'house of horrors' picture gallery to get across to MPs and the public the horrific damage these birds can do. Action on Cormorants also urges MPs to follow the lead of members of the All Party Parliamentary Group on Angling and become parliamentary supporters of the campaign to protect our fish.

In 2010 the Angling Trust won the agreement of Fisheries minister Richard Benyon to review the current ineffective licensing regime for controlling cormorant damage to our fisheries. The Defra Review Group is due to report shortly and the minister is expected to make an announcement in the winter.

Angling Trust National Campaigns Coordinator Martin Salter said: "We need every MP's office to be flooded with postcards and emails demanding that we have the right to protect our fish from the ravages of cormorants and goosanders. We know that our opponents on this issue are preparing a challenge and will seek to claim that a fourteen fold increase in cormorant numbers isn't a



problem when we all know that it is. Fortunately our campaign has the support of RSPB members who also love to fish and we have the fish stock surveys and match catch data to prove without doubt that the predator prey balance is out of kilter and needs to be addressed."

Angling Trust Chief Executive Mark Lloyd said:

"This is an opportunity for thousands of anglers to stand up and be counted. It will only take a few minutes to support our campaign to let MPs know that we care passionately about protecting our fish stocks and that we want action on cormorants and goosanders now. We want a new system that will give fishery managers the opportunity to control these birds responsibly without expensive and unnecessary bureaucracy. Please contact your MP now and, if you can, make a donation to our Action on Cormorants Fighting Fund or join the Angling Trust to help us campaign more loudly on cormorants and other important issues affecting angling and fish stocks."

Paul Knight, CEO of the Salmon & Trout Association, said: "Fish deserve as much protection as their predators. We have to manage on an ecosystem basis, with healthy wild fish populations in balance with their predators. We can no longer give greater conservation status to any one species just because it has more popular appeal, and so fishery managers need a flexible and rapid licensing system which enables them to protect threatened fish stocks at particular times, such as during the annual downstream migration of young salmon and sea trout."

Some of the top names in angling have pledged to support the campaign which was officially launched on the banks of the river Severn, a river once famous for its catches of roach and dace.

Local businesses in the Bridgnorth and Shrewsbury areas have been badly affected by the reduction in silver fish stocks and the cancellation of the regular fishing competitions which drew visiting anglers from all over the country.

Award winning film maker and RSPB member and former employee Hugh Miles said:

"The cormorant is a silver fish killer unparalleled in nature whose numbers have increased to such an extent that the middle reaches of many rivers, including my local Hampshire Avon, are now all but devoid of once common and sought after species such as roach. Well balanced ecosystems need a healthy balance between predator and prey and we need action now to restore that vital balance and give our fish a chance."

George Hollingbery MP, Chairman of the All Party Parliamentary Group on Angling said:

"I have witnessed first hand the damage that squadrons of cormorants have done to my local waters, where, in some cases fish stocks have been so badly depleted that they are no longer functioning fisheries. Angling delivers both environmental and economic benefit to communities the length and breadth of the UK. It is only right and proper that we allow fishing clubs and fishery managers the right to protect our fish from unsustainable predation."

"One of my great loves in angling is seeing and enjoying the birdlife whilst I sit there on the bank. But when an unsustainable imbalance occurs, as has happened with the huge increase in the number of

cormorants and goosanders on our waters, something has to be done to protect vulnerable fish species. We simply cannot sit there and watch our fish stocks go down to unacceptable levels. I back the Angling Trust's stance on the cormorant problem in this country one hundred per cent and urge everyone to get behind them now.

Former match legend and all round angler, Jan Porter of Shimano said:

"It's vital that as anglers we all wise up on how much impact these invasive birds are having on our fish stocks. Getting behind the campaign en masse is crucial to ensuring that everything possible is done to reduce a threat which is proliferating out of control. The price of a fishing licence these days - when many other water users pay nothing - should include much more support to help & protect many coarse and game fisheries and fish from being wiped out."

Angling Times columnist and river ace, Dave Harrell said: "We need every single angler to get behind this campaign as it is one of the most important things they will ever do. We all know how much damage these birds have caused and it is imperative that the law is changed as soon as possible. Without change, we will continue to see fish stocks damaged and greatly reduced but with anglers support, I am sure we can achieve our objective. However, without that support, the future of many fisheries in this country will remain seriously threatened."

Cormorants - Key Facts

- Biodiversity of our rivers and many still waters are at serious risk from excessive predation from cormorants
- Numbers have exploded in the last two decades to unsustainable levels
- Rivers and waterways are failing under the Water Framework Directive and of those failing over 50% do so due to poor fish stocks

- Waters that have been heavily impacted by cormorants take years to recover under the present system sometimes failing all together
- Populations of indigenous species like roach on the Hampshire Avon are under serious threat of extinction
- Modification of our rivers by man has resulted in salmon and sea trout being increasingly vulnerable to cormorants and goosanders as they try to migrate to sea through weirs and hydropower plants
- Direct threat to designated endangered fish species protected under European legislation
- Over wintering cormorants estimated at 23,000. Each individual eats at least one pound of fish EVERY DAY (2,760,000lb of fish each winter)
- Numbers increased by non-native immigrants (European subspecies Carbo Sinensis) from mainland Europe
- The present licensing system is woefully inadequate and does not give us the capabilities to protect our fish properly.
- The Eel Management Plans submitted and accepted by the European Commission estimate that between 29 & 43 tons of endangered eel is eaten by cormorants every year in England and Wales.
